

UPCOMING PRF SPECIAL EVENT



In an event co-sponsored by the Princeton Research Forum and Labyrinth Books, Robert Kanigel, a professor of science writing at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a member of the PRF Advisory Council, will talk about his latest book, *On an Irish Island*, published by Alfred A. Knopf, on Friday, March 30, at 6 p.m. The event is open to the general public and takes place at the Labyrinth bookstore on Nassau Street in Princeton.

Kanigel is an award-winning science writer whose previous books include *The Man Who Knew Infinity:* A Life of the Genius Ramanujan, High Season: How One French Riviera Town Has Seduced Travelers for Two Thousand Years, and Apprentice to Genius: The Making of a Scientific Dynasty.

Besides being a history of the Great Blasket Island in the 20th century, *On an Irish Island* is Kanigel's exploration of "how we live now, what we've left behind, and at what cost," and stems from his long preoccupation with the pace of modern life. He hopes that the book will prompt a conversation on the pace of life in the twenty-first century.

WORK-IN-PROGRESS BY ROBERT CRAIG FOCUSES ON EARLY NEW JERSEY HISTORY

On Tuesday, March 27, at 4 p.m., PRF Secretary Bob Craig will talk about "The First Builders of Middlesex County, New Jersey." The paper presents research results from a larger project that explores colonial architecture from the point of view of its builders in their social contexts. Unlike earlier presentations he has made to PRF, says Bob, "this is a true work-in-progress at the early stages of its development. Among the questions yet to be answered are: How did the English colonies of the 17th-century Atlantic seaboard get themselves built? Who were the ones who did the building, and what did the planting of American colonies look like from their point of view?" Bob's focus on the early builders of Middlesex County from the late 1660s through the early decades of the 18th century represents a small portion of a much larger topic.

"This research is still in the early stages, and its final shape is far from certain," he says. The talk will be hosted by Ann Morgan at her home.

Helen Schwartz is an artist/writer/journalist living in Princeton. In describing her life she says, "It's always been about art, one way or another." She is a graduate the Music and Art High School in New York City, which she describes as "...probably the experience that been most powerful in shaping who I am, today." After a lapse where she majored in economics at NYU, and classes at the Public Relations Society of America to complement a job in Public Relations at Dudley Anderson Yutzy in New York, Helen studied painting at the New School in New York and with Gregorio Prestopino in Roosevelt. She has also studied basket-weaving with Penobscot and Cherokee basket makers.



Helen has taught painting at the Princeton Adult School and the Princeton Art Association, printmaking at Rider College, and art history courses

at the Princeton Adult School. She is the author of *The New Jersey House*, Rutgers University Press, 1983, a survey of the state's domestic architecture. She was Public Information Officer at the Princeton University Art Museum, and before that, art critic/feature writer at *The Home News*, a daily newspaper published in New Brunswick. She lectures on art for the New Jersey Council for the Humanities. She is also President of the Board for *Le Triomphe d'Amour*, a Baroque performance group, was a member of the Princeton University Concerts Committee, and sits of the Board of Princeton Adult School. She was President of the New Jersey Society of Architectural Historians.

Helen's work is included in the collections of the New Jersey State, Zimmerli and Newark museums, Princeton, Harvard and Rutgers universities, and the American Embassy, Japan, among others. Her baskets have been included in National Basket Organization exhibitions, the NBO Internet Gallery, at the Peters Valley Craft Center, and were the subject of a one-person exhibition at the Arts Council of Princeton, as well as exhibitions at The New Jersev State Museum, Johnson and Johnson Gallerv, and Morpeth Gallery in Hopewell, among others. Her work will be included in the Transformations Crafts Exhibition in Hopewell in November. She is currently working as a basket weaver, doing research for a book on the Arts and Crafts Movement in New Jersey, and serving as Arts Programs Consultant for Meadow Lakes.

Helen has two children, Lisa, a news researcher in New York City who works for *The New York Times* and teaches Journalism Research at City University, and a son, Eric, a corporate bankruptcy attorney in Wilmington Delaware.

IN MEMORIAM

PRF notes with sadness the passing of former PRF member Sarah Hirschman, January 15 in Princeton. Sarah was renowned for her work with People & Stories/Gente y Cuentos, the organization she founded as a way of sharing great literature with those who have little or no formal education.

Born in Kovno, Lithuania in 1921, Sarah moved to Paris with her family in 1925. She attended the Lycée Molière, and at 18, her studies with Simone de Beauvoir prompted a life-long interest in philosophy. In 1939, just before the outbreak of World War II, the family relocated to New York City. After studying philosophy at Columbia and Cornell Universities, Sarah moved to California, where she received a BA in philosophy and a master's degree in French literature from the University of California, Berkeley. In 1941, she married Albert O. Hirschman, a young German scholar who had lived in France for several years.

In 1974, the Hirschmans moved to Princeton when Sarah's husband was appointed a faculty member at the Institute for Advanced Study. In Princeton, Sarah joined the Princeton Research Forum where she shared her deep love for literature. She enjoyed reading the works of Dostoevsky, Chekhov, and Montaigne in their original languages, as well as a wide range of literature in English and was a great admirer and patron of the Princeton University Firestone Library. Her 2009 book, *People &* Stories/Gente y Cuentos, Who Owns Literature? Communities Find Their Voice Through Short Stories, has been translated into Spanish by Fondo de Cultura Economica, Argentina.

Predeceased by her daughter, Lisa, Sarah is survived by her husband, Albert O. Hirschman, daughter Katia Salomon of Paris, two sons-in-law, Alain Salomon and Peter Gourevitch; four grandchildren, Lara Salomon Pawlicz, Grégoire Salomon, Alex, and Nick Hirschman Gourevitch; and seven great grandchildren, Hannah, Rebecca, Isaac, Eva, Rachel, Olivia, and Ezra.

CALL FOR PAPERS ON THE VALUE OF LIBERAL LEARNING

The 12th Conference of the International Society for Intellectual History, on "The Importance of Learning: Liberal Education and Scholarship in Historical Perspective," will take place at Princeton University, September 4-6, 2012. The ideal of liberal education, long a mainstay of Western ideals of higher education, is suddenly under attack the world over. In country after country, the idea that higher education should aim primarily at the cultivation of the intellect and sensibility rather than at preparation for a particular vocation is being swept vigorously aside by more exclusively utilitarian conceptions. The international membership of the International Society for Intellectual History is uniquely well suited to examining this phenomenon from a genuinely historical and cosmopolitan perspective, and this task will be the focus of the Society's next

conference. Proposals are welcomed for papers on any period, region, tradition or discipline (including the arts, humanities, sciences, and various forms of professional learning) which deal with liberal education, criticisms of it, and alternatives to it in historical perspective. In addition to papers, contributions may be made in the form of posters, which should aim to document ongoing attempts to reform higher education systems currently being pursued in individual countries around the world.
